

Deep Run Elementary administrators and school staff have studied our student performance data to decide on the most important areas of improvement for our school. For the 2021-2022 school year, DRES will focus on the following areas:

Mathematics: The HCPSS Mathematics Curriculum aligns with the Maryland College and Career Ready Standards.

- 1. Teachers will engage in professional learning, through coaching and <u>peer-to-peer observations</u> with the MST, focused on facilitating meaningful discourse through implementation of mathematical language routines. Teachers will apply learning to practice.
- 2. Standards-based learning targets will be used for selecting assessment tasks to determine student understanding. Teachers will use evidence from assessment tasks to engage in data discussions that

English Language Arts: The HCPSS Language Arts Curriculum aligns with the Maryland College and Career Ready Standards.

- Teachers will engage in professional learning (coaching) focused on formative data collection, analysis of the data, and subsequent differentiated but rigorous reading and writing tasks.
- Teachers will develop student mindset and provide students with engaging independent learning activities that are grade level, culturally responsive, and standards-based during ELA (Culturally Responsive Teaching).

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identify, determine and provide instructional supports, including appropriate scaffolds, to all students.

3. Teachers will engage in professional learning (including coaching and peer observations) focused on consistent student feedback through meaningful reading and writing conferences with students and incorporate self-reflection strategies that lead to effective and individualized student goal setting.

Belonging: Equitable and restorative discipline practices support students' access to a well-rounded curriculum and opportunities, which ultimately lead to graduation and long-term success. HCPSS is committed to reducing disproportionality in implementing discipline, including reducing the need for disciplinary actions, ensuring consistency in suspension usage, and to meet school quality targets for discipline proportionality that are included in all School Improvement Plans (SIPs).

- Staff will work to create both a personal and schoolwide vision of inclusion, belonging, and dignity through small group professional learning opportunities to increase awareness about how their beliefs and bias impact students in our school community and to increase awareness of the supports available through alternative education. Strategies will be explored, practiced, and implemented with fidelity through intentionally designed instruction and professional learning opportunities for teams.
- 2. Staff and students will create a welcoming school community with a focus on student voice through community circles, surveys, student leadership opportunities, and student conferences. A cohort of teacher leaders will continue our DRES Restorative Justice work in partnership with the HCPSS Office of Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion.

Grade Span Goals:

Pre-K & Kindergarten

- English Language Arts With prompting and support, Pre-K and Kindergarten students will interact with literary and informational text. By the end of Kindergarten, students will independently read and comprehend beginning reader texts. Students will independently write, draw or dictate written responses to what they have read. Independently, students will write, draw or dictate about the various writing genres.
- Math Throughout Pre-K and Kindergarten, students will learn to count to 100 and write numbers to 20, where emphasis is placed on ten and some more, building a foundation for place value understanding. Beginning addition and subtraction starts in kindergarten. Students will sort and classify groups of objects and identify basic shapes.

Grades 1 & 2

- English Language Arts --In language arts, we use a literacy instructional model to meet the needs of students. Standards-based instruction is differentiated through on-going data collection. Through the Being A Reader and Being A Writer programs, a strong emphasis is on foundational skills, read-alouds, differentiated small group instruction, discussions of text, daily independent reading, and writing instruction. Students are consistently engaged in peer collaborative conversations, one-on-one reading and writing conferences, and multiple opportunities to further develop independent language arts skills.
- Math Primary mathematics is focused on counting, representing and comparing whole numbers; developing understanding of whole number relationships and place value; developing understanding of addition and

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subtraction, including strategies for addition and subtraction; and solving real world problems.

Grades 3, 4, & 5

- English Language Arts -In language arts, we use a literacy instructional model to meet the needs of students.
 Standards-based instruction is differentiated through on-going data collection. Through the Making Meaning and Being A Writer programs, a strong emphasis is on comprehension skills, read alouds, differentiated small group instruction, discussions of text, daily independent reading, and writing instruction. Students are consistently engaged in peer collaborative conversations, one-on-one reading and writing conferences, and multiple opportunities to further develop independent language arts skills.
- Math -Intermediate mathematics is focused on developing a deeper understanding of place value; developing an understanding of multiplication and division strategies, including multi-digit strategies; developing an understanding of the meaning of fractions, equivalence, and applying the four operations to fractions and decimals; and developing an understanding of geometric figures.
