

What is Title I?

Title I is a federally funded program designed to support students in reading and/or math. In general, Title I funds provide additional staffing, instructional materials, and family resources. Title I teachers include math specialists, reading specialists, and/or classroom teachers who work with students to support their academic needs through interventions, co-teaching, and/or reducing class size. Family resources are based on family input/needs and may include additional programs, at-home learning materials, and other collaborative initiatives that increase family-school partnership. Grade Level Goals

Pre-K

- English Language Arts- By the end of Pre-K, students will show growth in their understanding of the purpose of letters. This includes making connections between letter names and the sounds they represent. All students will work on identifying and writing their first names using upper and lowercase letters appropriately.
- Math- By the end of Pre-K, students will count verbally to 10 by ones and develop verbal counting to 20 by ones. Students will identify written numbers 0-10. By the end of Pre-K, students will demonstrate awareness of one to one correspondence up to 10.

Kindergarten

- English Language Arts By the end of kindergarten, students will interact with literary and informational text with prompting and support. By the end of Kindergarten, students will show growth towards independently reading and comprehending beginning reader texts. Students will independently write, draw or dictate written responses to what they have read. Independently, students will write, draw or dictate within a variety of writing genres.
- Math By the end of Kindergarten, students will be able to demonstrate growth towards counting to 100 and writing numbers to 20, while also decomposing numbers 11 to 19. Kindergarten students will demonstrate an understanding of adding and subtracting within 10.

Grade 1

- English Language Arts- By the end of first grade, students will demonstrate comprehension by asking and answering questions about key details in a text. Students will use known words and word parts to help in reading and spelling new words.
- Math- By the end of first grade, students will read, write, and count to 120. Students will build place value foundations while decomposing, composing, and comparing two-digit numbers. Students will add and subtract

Grade 2

- English Language Arts By the end of second grade, students will build their foundational skills and demonstrate comprehension by asking and answering questions about key details in literature and informational texts. Students will use known words and word parts to help in reading and spelling new words. By the end of second grade, students will demonstrate word solving skills while reading at a good pace.
- Math By the end of second grade, students will fluently add and subtract two-digit numbers using strategies, and begin adding and subtracting three-digit numbers using strategies around their understanding of place value.

Grade 3

- English Language Arts- By the end of third grade, students will read with accuracy and fluency to support comprehension and decode words with multiple syllables.
- Math- By the end of third grade, students will begin to build a conceptual understanding of fractions, multiplication, and division with an emphasis on basic fact strategies up to x10.

Grade 4

- English Language Arts- By the end of fourth grade, students will demonstrate growth with reading with accuracy and fluency to support comprehension. Students will also use knowledge of phonics skills, word recognition, and prefixes, base words, and suffixes to read and understand the meaning of unfamiliar words with multiple syllables.
- Math- By the end of fourth grade, students will demonstrate growth of their understanding of multiplication and division while working with multi-digit numbers, using strategies involving place value. Fourth grade students will continue to work with fractions, and will begin to understand the foundational concepts of decimals.

Grade 5

- English Language Arts- By the end of fifth grade, students will read with accuracy and fluency to support
 comprehension and demonstrate comprehension by quoting accurately when explaining what is directly stated
 in the text and will make inferences when reading literature and informational texts. Students will also use
 knowledge of phonics skills, word recognition, and prefixes, base words, and suffixes to read and understand
 the meaning of unfamiliar words with multiple syllables.
- Math- By the end of fifth grade, students will understand the place value system, use and explain multi-digit strategies, and understand the concepts of volume. By the end of fifth grade, students will extend and apply the four operations to fractions and decimals.
